

Forward


Located in Columbia, Tennessee, Mercer Hall was the home of James Hervey Otey when he was named the first Episcopal Bishop of Tennessee in 1834. Bishop Otey began the garden behind Mercer Hall on a plot that was once the vegetable garden for President James K. Polk. Over the years the garden was enhanced by later owners including the addition of the gazebo that originally sat on the grounds of the Columbia Institute, a girls preparatory school that was started by Bishop Otey. Mercer Hall is still a private residence today.


When I visited the garden in 2003, it had not been maintained in awhile, but was still a magical place. Walking through the garden, I could imagine how it once had been and what it could be again.
